## Tracy, Manteca, and Lincoln Unified Students are Spelling Bee Champs

What does it take to be San Joaquin County Spelling Bee Champ? For Junior High Division titleholder Jonelle Mungcal, an eighth-grader of Great Valley Elementary in Manteca Unified, it takes avid reading and studying with her father.

"I'm excited about winning," said Mungcal, who shared that her victory will be rewarded with a new book given to her by her parents. "I've always been naturally good at spelling. I think it is because I love to read."

More than 80 students from grades four through six (Elementary Division) and seven through nine (Junior High Division) competed to be County Speller of the Year. This year's San Joaquin County Spelling Bee winners in the Junior High Division are Mungcal and Jao Obaldo, an eighth-grader from George Kelly Elementary of Tracy Unified.

In the Elementary Division, Mashal M. Chhotani, a sixth-

grader from George Kelly Elementary School, part of Tracy Unified, placed first and the runner-up was Leandra M. Evans, a sixth-grader from Claudia Landeen, part of Lincoln Unified.

The top two winners in each division earned a plaque, received a U.S. Savings Bond, and will attend the state competition. All participants were awarded medals and certificates.

The State Junior High Competition will be at Miller Creek Middle School, located within Marin County on May 9. The State Elementary Competition is scheduled for May 16 at Sonoma State University.

ophomore Salwa Hashima from Venture Academy Family of Schools toured pediatrics, forensics, radiology, and even "scrubbed in" to watch a cyst removal surgery while in DECISION Medicine, a summer program offered through San Joaquin County Medical Society. Although Hashima always dreamed of entering the field of medicine as a doctor, this elite program solidified her passion and opened her eyes to areas she had not thought about.

Hashima was one of 24 high-achieving high school students selected to receive first-hand experiences within the medical field.

"DECISION Medicine is something that I will never forget," said Hashima. "I didn't just listen to professionals talk about the medical field, I got to witness it."

Gina DeRoos, employer outreach specialist for Venture Academy, encouraged Hashima to apply for the

"DECISION Medicine has given Salwa the knowledge and determination to succeed," said DeRoos. "I can see the growth in her every day and I am certain that this opportunity has contributed to it."



DECISION Medicine is a two-week program where participants receive realworld experiences as they explore the many facets of a career as a physician.

Through DECISION Medicine, students participate in various team development activities, as well as several one-onone mentoring opportunities with local physicians. Students also visit University of California Davis Medical School and several regional hospitals where they gain behind-the-scenes experiences.

"This is a wonderful opportunity for San Joaquin County teens who are interested in pursing a career within the medical field," said Executive Director of The San Joaquin Medical Society, Michael Steenburgh.

**DEBBI HOPMAN RECENTLY** announced her retirement as Director of Special Education at Jefferson Elementary School District.

Before serving Jefferson students, the Berkeley alumnus started her career as a special education teacher at Tracy Unified. Soon after she received her administrative credential, Hopman worked as a project assistant for Categorical Programs and served as assistant principal at Williams Middle School. She then moved to Linden Unified as principal of Waverly School followed by director of Student Services

Hopman is known for her ability to bring support for education through partnerships with the community. In fact, in 2005 she received the Friend of Kendall School Award for her part in bringing center-based Early Intervention Behavioral Treatment (EIBT) services through Kendall School, a non-public agency serving young children with

autism, to the Jefferson Elementary School District.

The addition of a center-based program proved to be valuable to the continuum of services for students with autism. It is undoubtedly what Hopman considers as one of the most important accomplishments of her career.
